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PREFACE

This Handbook has been developed to provide a concise but comprehensive summary of the more than 400 projects and 224 organizations which received support from USA for Africa during the five years of its existence.

USA for Africa's funding covered a wide range of projects and programs, from emergency relief for victims of famine, to the institutional support of local African Voluntary Development Organizations (AVDOs). Funding was concentrated in ten target countries: Angola, Burkina Faso, Chad, Ethiopia, Mali, Mauritania, Mozambique, Niger, Senegal, and Sudan. In addition,a smaller number of project grants and regional block grants were made to non-target countries in Africa,and support was provided to approximately two dozen organizations for their development education work in the United States.

The information in this Handbook is not presented as an assessmentor an evaluation of efforts funded by USA for Africa. The Handbook does attempt to accurately summarize information presented in funding proposals and related documents approved by USA for Africa's Board of Directors. A version of this Handbook is also available in French. USA for Africa takes full responsibility for the information presented here. Any questions or comments regarding the contents of this Handbook should be directed to USA for Africa.

ANGOLA

Development Aid From People to People (ADPP)

C.P.345 Skorkaervei 8 Luanda, Angola 6990 Ulfborg, Denmark

DAPP, a Danish organization, advocates a people-to-people approach. DAPP encourages the involvement of Scandinavian people in its development programs through requests for cash or in-kind donations, and by the recruitment of volunteers for its work in Angola, Mozambique,T anzania, Zimbabwe, and Guinea Bissau.

1988

Agricultural Production in Bengo \$ 150,000

This farm project is designed to increase food production in the vicinity of Caxito,home to many refugees. Profits from farm produce were used to raise the living standards of refugees by establishing a clinic, housing units, and a water purification facility. In addition, training was provided for war orphans.

1989

Environment Project in Bengo Province \$87,000

This grant was used to expand Angola's National Tree Planting Campaign, an effort to mobilize the rural population to plant trees for firewood, fruit, and soil conservation. Four village nurseries, were established, each with a capacity of 20,000 trees, a small tool shed was constructed, fencing was put up around nursery areas, and training was provided for management staff.

Ministry of Health (MOH)

C.P.1201 Avenida I Congresso, No.67 Luanda, Angola The Ministry of Health is a government agency which is responsible for the initiation, provision and maintenance of health services.

1989

Medical and Sanitation Assistance to Displaced Populations \$250.000

This grant was designed to improve living conditions for displaced people in and around Caixito. Emphasis was on the provision of potable water, and providing training to health technicians in how to utilize Oxfam water kits

Organization of Angolan Women (OMA)

Rua Comandante Gika-199 Luanda, Angola

OMA, with more than 1 1/2 million members, is a party-affiliated organization which was founded in 1973. Its primary function is to mobilize, politicize and train women in order to integrate them into the process of national development. OMA maintains representatives at government-sponsored refugee reception centers.

1989

Sewing Cooperative \$250,000

Funds were used for the construction of a building and the purchase ofsewing machines, material and patterns for clothing manufacture. Training in sewing skills permitted women to clothe their families and eam an income. Funds provided for the purchase of office equipment, and supplies enabled the group to improve its management activities.

United Nations Children's Fund (UNICCEF)

Three United Nations Plaza, New York, New York 10017

UNICEF helps developing countries improve the condition of children and youth by providing assistance for community-based service in areas of primary health care, water supply, formal and non-formal education, nutrition and emergency operations.

Expansion of Nutrition and Growth Monitoring Services \$ 150,000

This project was designed to reduce the high prevalence of malnutrition among Angolan women and children through the promotion of growth monitoring services, reinforcement of nutrition rehabilitation services and establishment of a national nutrition surveillance system. Support was given for the training of national, provincial and district level nutrition program managers and health workers.

Agency for Co-operation and Research in Development (ACORD)

ACORD is an international consortium of NGOs which provides support to local organizations and implements its own large-scale,long-term integrated development programs in Africa.

1990

Development Program for Displaced People \$250,000

Funding has allowed ACORD to work closely with the State Secretariat for Social Affairs (SEAS) to seek improvements in the living standards of displaced families who have been resettled in the community of Viana II outside of Luanda.

BENIN

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)7

8 Beacon Street Boston, Massachusetts 02108 The UUSC, is a non-sectarian, non-profit membership organization founded in 1939 and dedicated to enhancing the economic, social, civil and political rights of people throughout the world. For over twenty-five years, the Service Committee has provided technical assistance and material and financial support to Africa.

1987

Health for the People, By the People/Conference \$12,000

This funding was used to support 7 African health care professionals to attend a workshop/conference on the training and use of village health workers for the delivery of primary health care.

BURKINA FASO

African Development Bank (ADB)

Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire

The ADB is the largest indigenous multi-national finance institution in Africa. Its central purpose includes financing activities that promote Africa's long term development. The cofinancing of selected ADB projects through USA for Africa grants reduced countries'debt exposure on these projects and freed up ADB funds for additional projects.

1987

Comoe Integrated Development Project \$ 838,200

Funds contributed to the development of agricultural production; improvements in roads and social infrastructure; provision of credits and fertilizer to farmers' veterinary services; and training in improved methods for various basic food and commercial crops.

Soum Integrated Development Project \$1,460,000

The goals of this project, implemented in an area hard hit by drought, were to promote forage crops; improve water resources; improve the health of inhabitants and their livestock; organize

and train livestock raisers; reinforce support services to herders; and conduct research and follow-up studies.

Africare

440 'R' Street, N.W. Washington, D.C. 20001

Africare assists in the human and economic development of African countries by developing water resources, increased food production, delivery of basic health services, and emergency assistance to refugees.

1985

Health and Nutrition \$248,000

Funds to this nutrition andhealth care project were used to provide basic medical equipment and supplies for 12rural dispensaries and to support a large immunization project. In addition, two hundred hectares of land were culivated to produce vegetables for local consumption.

1986

Toma Zone Vegetable Gardens \$62,500

This agricultural production project focused on expanding the dry season food supply to a population of approximately 80,000 people. The project also increased employment for local youth in order to reduce seasonal migration to urban areas.

1986

Boulpon Village Food Production \$59,750

This program focused on dry season farming and irrigation to benefit a population of 18,000. Program activities centered around vegetable production, well development, animal traction and food storage.

1988

Water Resources for Food Security \$252,000

Grant funds allowed Africare to construct 3 multipurpose dams to irrigate 60 hectares of rice fields and 12 hectares of vegetable gardens. Approximately 18 villages, with a population of 60,000 people, benefited.

Association de Développement Brigade Naaba Lolga (ADBNL)

BP 4683

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

The Development Association of Naaba Lolga was formed in 1968 by community leaders from the Bam province. During the past decade, the association has been encouraging and organizing peasant initiatives to combat erosion and to develop income-generating skills.

1990

Women's Integrated Development Program \$47,300

This grant was used for dry season market-gardening, the construction of a small artisan center for training in income generation activities, setting up a revolving loan fund for women, the installation of a grain mill and local leadership training for women.

Association Delwendé

BP 5178

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

Delwendé was formed in 1981 by local citizens concerned about rural development issues in Burkina Faso. Since 1987 Delwendé has implemented a number of development projects in reforestation, water and sanitation, bio-gas energy, agricultural production and women's programs.

1990

Installation of Bore-hole and Grinding Mill \$20,500

This grant provided assistance to a local women's association to make clean water easily accessible to the village and to lighten the burden women bear in food production. Funds

were used to purchase a millet grinding machine and to install a bore-hole equiped with a pump. The project also provided project management and technical training to the village development committee and the women's group.

Association Française des Volontaires du Progrès (AFVP)

BP 947

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

AFVP is a French NGO which provides French volunteer technicians to promote village based development. It intervenes in sectors as diverse as agriculture, water development, and cooperative training.

1986

Kalsaka Water Development \$80,000

These funds were used to help implement a water development and reforestation program in the area of Kalsaka, Bulkiemdé Province. The program benefited approximately 25,000 people and focused on dam and reservoir construction, tree planting and fish stocking to increase food availability.

Association Pour la Productivité-Burkina Faso (APP)

BP 72

Fada N'Gourma, Burkina Faso

This organization was formed by former staff of Partners for Productivity in Burkina Faso in 1986. APP provides training and support to peasant associations in the areas of credit and small-scale enterprise.

1988

Training in the Use of Credit \$75,000

Funds were used for training in small income generating projects and to increase a loan fund managed by APP.

The project also provided support to APP's garage and vehicle repair program.

Association Vive le Paysan (AVLP)

B.P.6274

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

AVLP is a rural association which was founded in 1979. It is administered entirely by its peasant members. Its work is centered on providing training and technical support to farmers to improve agriculture, health, and education. AVLP now serves over 2,000 villagers in more than 40 villages in the Saponé area south of the capital.

1988

Community Health Program

\$50,000This grant provided training and refresher courses for 80 community health personnel focusing on the prevention and treatment of endemic diseases such as diarrhea and malaria. Education was also given in basic techniques of community sanitation and hygiene, and ways to organize village clean-up campaigns.

1989

Grain Mills for Saponé \$ 39.000

Funds were used to expand an existing food processing project by supplying six additional grain mills to women's groups active in AVLP programs. These mills allowed women's groups to earn income, and reduced the time and energy required to process grains manually. The labor saving devices increased food availability while helping to alleviate the burden on women.

1990

Construction of Village Learning Centers \$47,670

This project allowed AVLP to construct 10 village centers in the Department of Saponé. These centers, used primarily by women, have increased the association's capacity to provide training to its members in reading, writing, basic math, and project management. In addition to a classroom, each center provides a nursery for the children of participants, and a cooking area for preparing communal meals.

Institutional Support \$50,000

This grant provided AVLP with the institutional support necessary to continue the develop-ment and operation of a welding workshop (in collaboration with the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee) as well as other development projects.

Association des Volontaires pour le Développement (AVD)

B.P. 4683

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

AVD is an energetic Burkinabe VDO formed in the early 1980's by villagers confronting the devastation to their farming community caused by drought. AVD works throughout the Bam and Bulkiemdé provinces. All of its efforts envisage the "taking charge" by local communities of their own development.

1986

Kougsabla Kitchen/Garden Project \$ 54,628

These funds were used to help conduct a food production and land management program in the village of Kougsabla. The program focused on enclosing land to grow cattle fodder, developing vegetable and diversified garden crops and providing employment to young men and improving cattle breeding. The program benefited some 9,000 people.

1988

Women's Sheep-Raising Project \$41,500

The purpose of this project was to finance loans to women for the purchase of sheep which they would raise within their family compounds. Participants were able to generate additional income, acquire knowledge of improved domestic sheep raising, increase food availability for the inhabitants in the region and create a revolving fund to finance future projects.

1991

Institutional Support \$50,000

This grant provided AVD with the institutional support necessary to continue its programs in the areas of environmental conservation, food production, women's income-generating activities, training and literacy.

Bureau de Liaison des ONG et Associations Nationales (BLONGA)

BP 4683

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

National development leaders decided to create a structure that would help strengthen local development agencies and be responsive to the particular concerns and needs of African Voluntary Development Organizations and their grassroots partners. BLONGA's overall goal is to work toward bringing together local VDO's to share common experiences in order to develop dynamic initiatives in rural areas.

1990

Institutional Support \$43,700

This grant provided a vehicle and administrative overhead costs to this new organization to allow BLONGA to offer on-going support to its members and to local grassroots development organizations in the areas of project design, implementation, monitoring and evaluation.

Center for the International Development and Environment (CIDE)

1209 New York Avenue, NW Washington, DC 20006

CIDE is a center of the World Resources Institute. It works at the field level to promnote sustainable development, which meets human needs without destroying the natural resource base and which reflects people's cultural and social values. CIDE's work emphasizes technical support, institution strengthening, and policy advice for developing-country governments and NGOs.

1989

Community-Based Natural Resource Management

\$ 37,500

The objective of this project was to increase the number of environmentally-sound and sustainable development projects in rural areas. Working through SPONG, the major NGO consortium in Burkina Faso, CIDE has provided technical support training and financial resources to NGOs to carry out small-scale natural resource management projects with community groups.

Cooperative Artisanale du Liptako (COARLIP)

BP 71

Dori, Burkina Faso

COARLIP is a women's cooperative organization formed in 1982 to improve women's income through the production and marketing of traditional woven blankets. The women of COARLIP have as their overall goals the development and expansion of traditional handicrafts in the region, and improving the lives of their children by increasing therevenue of co-op members.

1990

Revolving Fund and Shop Construction \$25,000

Funds to this weaving cooperative were designed to increase the income of members by allowing COARLIP to purchase in bulk primary products used in the manufacturing of blankets. Increases in the production and sale of its high quality traditional blankets has been promoted through the construction of a storeroom/shop for use by co-op members.

Cooperative de Production Artisanale-Femmes de Ouagadougou (COPAFO) BP 4979

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

COPAFO was formed in 1984 by a group of 36 women artisans so that together they could overcome their production and marketing constraints.

1990

Introduction of New Weaving Technologies

\$ 20,860

This project provided the cooperative with funds to purchase 10 high quality looms and obtain technicaltraining needed to successfully produce and market improved woven articles. Working with the Canadian VDO Desjardins, this grant also allowed COPAFO to produce samples and conduct market studies, begin production of both cloth and finished products, and recruit and expand training to new co-op members.

Groupe de Recherche et d'Action pour un Développement Endogène de la Femme Rurale du Burkina (GRADE-FRB)

BP 3656

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

A Burkinabé women's development organization formed in 1984, GRADE's overall goal is to mobilize women's efforts, carry out concrete actions which willimprove women's quality of life, and help them become more conscious of their potential.

1990

Nabigtenga Integrated Development Project \$40,000

This grant was used to improve social and econome conditions through activities which help women eam income and improve their work conditions. Project components included project management and literacy training;installation of 2 wells with hand pumps; vegetable production for consumption and income eaming;construction of a cereal bank; and the installation of a grain mill.

1991

Institutional Support \$75,000

This grant provided GRADE-FRB with the institutional support necessary to continue its programs in the areas of food production anad processing, credit and savings, and incomegenerating project management training for women.

INADES-Formation

BP 8 BP 1022

Abidjan 08, Cote d'Ivoire

INADES-Formation (African Institute for Economic and Social Development) is a regional African NGO headquartered at Abidjan, Côte d'Ivoire with other offices in Burkina Faso, Burundi, Cameroon, Ethiopia, Kenya, Rwanda, Togo and Zaire. A training institute for the promotion of African development in the areas of agriculture, community development, and environmental protection, INADES offers correspondence courses and training workshops to educate extension workers and farmers. Particular efforts are made to include women in these activities.

1990

Léna Development and Training Program \$49,490

This grant provided training and support for women's groups in small-enterprise development and allowed young farmers to develop sustainable agriculture methods and to reinvigorate their organization's structure. It also provided assistance to a group of herders to set-up a veterinary pharmacy to improve the health of their livestock.

International Catholic Child Bureau (ICCB)

Geneva, Switzerland

This consortium works to promote primary health education for children by providing training and support to local groups.

1987

Child-to-Child Health Education Workshop \$10,200

The workshop brought together key people from the health and education sectors as well as from youth and children's movements to finalize educational material and plan its distribution within the country.

Office de Développement des Eglises Evangéliques (ODE)

BP 108

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

ODE is the development arm of the Federation of Evangelical churches and missions (FEME)in Burkina Faso. It is one of the most well established local VDOs in Burkina Faso.

1986

Dam Construction at Mitieredougou \$ 183,000

ODE worked with the local population to construct a dam in order to provide greater access to water for a population of approximately 25,000 people.

Promo Femmes/Développement Sport (PFDS)

BP 2532

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

PFDS was created in 1982, first as an association concerned with promoting sports among women and girls in Burkina Faso. As the government itself began programs to facilitate and encourage sports among women, PFDS shifted its focus to women's development needs and concerns.

1990

Water and Agricultural Production in Oufré \$30,450

This grant was used by Tu Manegh-Ba, the Women's Association in Oufré, for the construction of a grain bank; the installation of a hand-pump equipped bore-hole well; and the installation of a milling machine. Training provided by PFDS in collaboration with Six-S, allowed the women to manage integrated development activities on thier own. A small revolving fund, managed by the women's association with PFDS, will cover maintenance costs and allow additional projects to be initiated within the community.

Emergency Food Aid \$45,950

This grant assisted Promo Femmes in assuring food security in Oufre, one of several villages severely affected by locust infestation and drought conditions. In collaboration with Tu-Maneghba, the village women's association, PFDS purchased 100,000 kg of millet to replenish food stocks and to prevent malnutrition in Oufre and neighboring villages.

Institutional Support \$50,000

This grant provided PFDS with the institutional support necessary to continue its work in the areas of famine relief, health education, literacy and project management training for women.

Sahel Solidarité

B.P.372Secteur 11Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

Sahel Solidarité was created by an interdenominational group of Muslims, Catholics, and Protestants to provide relief services to those affected by the 1973 drought. The organization has since carried out many development projects in a wide variety of sectors.

1988

Village Irrigation \$ 37,300

This grant was used to drill wells in the villages of Rambo, Pourra, and Gourcy. Villagers were provided with training in sanitation, well maintenance, and market gardening, as well as literacy and numeracy.

Save The Children Federation (SCF/US)

54 Wilton Road P.O.Box 950 Westport, CT 06881

Save the Children is a private, voluntary, non-sectarian community development organization founded in 1932. Save the Children programs aim to improve the quality of life for children, their families, and their communities through self-help development projects.

Integrated Relief Program \$ 240,000

This grant funded food production and storage, medical supplies, and transportation and logistics for drought-stricken Burkina Faso.

1986

Dry Season Farming at Dori \$77,338

Fundswere used for the intensification of diry season irigated food production by vilage groups to promote ood and the construction of wells and small dams.1986

Dry Season Farming at Saponé \$113,852

This grant was also used to promote food security and self-sufficiency through intensified irrigated agricultural production during the dry season.

1987

Training for Improved Nutrition and Maternal/Child Health Care \$250,000

This program incorporated nutrition intervention, MCH care outreach activities, the prevention and early treatment of endemic diseases, immunization campaigns, and health education. Funds were used to train government and village-level health workers, as well as the general population, in health care interventions.

Secrétariat des Organisations Non-Gouvernmentales (SPONG)

BP 131

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

SPONG represents the largest association of national and international non-governmental development organizations working in Burkina Faso. SPONG works to promote and facilitate collaboration and coordinated acton between members and serves as an important point of contact between VDOs, the government, and bi-lateral and multi-lateral donors.

1990

NGO Training \$ 17,000

This grant is helping SPONG set up a series of training sessions on project development and proposal writing for localNGOs and other development organizations in Burkina.

SOS-Sahel International/Burkina Faso

B.P.1170

Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso

SOS-Sahel International was organized in Dakar, Senegal in 1977, and has member organizations in most of the Sahelian countries. Members established a network for financial assistance and technological cooperation with Great Britain, France, Luxembourg, Belgium, and Italy. Each African SOS-Sahel is autonomous.

1988

Food Production \$ 26,583

This grant was provided to help to develop a five-hectare market garden in Baraogoa village. Approximately 60women participated in producing, harvesting, and selling garden crops.

Union des Féderations des Groupements "NAAM" (Groupements Naam)

B.P.100

Ouahigouya, Burkina Faso

Groupements Naam, organized in 1967, is made up of more than 2,000 groups and involves at least one-half million people. Groupements Naam utilizes training methods based upon the traditional concepts and techniques of the ethnic groups involved. Community organizing and training projects are rooted in local priorities, and are implemented by local groups with assistance, when needed, from the central organization.

1986

Integrated Development at Yatenga \$141.128

These funds helped to implement a food production program in the areas of Ouahigouya and Gourcy, Yatenga Province which benefited approximately 175,000 people. Program activities were in small scale irrigation, vegetable garden production and intensive animal husbandry to improve food availability at the village level.

1988

Block Grant to Groupements Naam/Six-S \$200,000

Objectives of this grant were to enhance the abilities of this development network to support projects which respond to the needs and priorities expressed by local people, and to promote community organization activities that encourage independence and self-sufficiency at the grassroots level.

1988

Dam Construction \$ 250,000

Funds were used for the construction of a dam and related community development activities. These included Feracy and numeracy taining, ant-erosion and tree replanting techniques, and improved agricutural mathoda for residents of the Gourcy area.

Unitatian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)

1986

Training of Medical Personnel \$ 54,000

This project was a collaborative effort of UUSC and twolocal grassroots groups, Association Vive le Paysan and the Parents'Associationof Kamboinse. The project improved the health status of two rural communities by providing training and strengthening the capabilities of local medical personnel.

United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF)

Three United Nations Plaza New York, NY 10017

UNICEF helps developing countries improve conditions of children and youth through assistance for community-based service in areas of primary health care, water supply, formal and non-formal education, nutrition, and emergency operations.

1985

Cholera Control

\$150,000An estimated 200,000 people benefited from this cholera disease control program. The program was initiated in thirteen provinces in BurkinaFaso.

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United Nations Development Program (UNDP)

One United Nations Plaza Room DC1-2389 New York, NY 10017

UNDP is the world's largest grant development assistance organization, serving over 150countries and territories.

1986

Logistical Support \$50,000

These funds were used to purchase and cover the initial operating costs of two four-wheel drive diesel engine trucks.

World Relief

450 Gunderson Drive P.O.Box WRC Carol Stream, Illinois Wheaton, IL 60187 World Relief, a non-profit relief organization founded in 1944, works to satisfy the identified needs of victims of disaster, oppression or chronic poverty; and of the needs of the members and participating churches and denominations.

1985

Food/Storage/Transportation \$162,000

These funds were used for the construction of 10 cereal banks and the organization of 12 vegetable garden projects in drought-stricken Burkina Faso. The grant also enabled World Reliefto purchase a transportation vehicle to enhance its overall capabilities.

1988

Cultivation of Shea Nuts, Ground Nuts in Sissili Province \$73,040

Women's groups from 5 vilages in Sissiliprovince grow shea nuts, ground nuts and sesame. Oil presses and other appropriate technologies were introduced to save time and energy for women who use the nuts to produce oil, soap and butter for household use and for sale. The added income and access to these high-calorie foods are expected to improve the nutritional status of villagers.

CAMEROON

Family Health International (FHI)

One Triangle Drive Research Triangle Park, NC 27709

Family Health International is an American NGO that has been working with the Malien Ministry of Public Health and the Malien Family Planning Association since 1979 to improve maternal and child health in Mali.

1987

Program among AIDS High-Risk Groups \$ 63,447

This program was to develop an intervention model which would slow the transmission of HIV infection among urban prostitutes, a population at high risk of contracting and spreading the virus. It provided training to a certain number of prostitutes as health educators

whose tasks was to communicate to other prostitutes the risks and consequences of AIDS and to provide them with condoms and spermicides in order to prevent infection.

ACORD is an international consortium of European NGOs which provides support to local organizations and implements its own large-scale, long-term integrated development programs in Africa.

1986

Project Vehicle

\$17,000

A Land Rover vehicle was provided to an agriculture program set up to help solve problems of food security, declining purchasing power and agricultural input shortages. The project reached approximately five thousand people resettled in the regions of Bokoro and Guera.

Action Internationale Contre la Faim (AICF)

Extension Training/Documentation Center \$16,000

This grant was used to fund a training workshop for extension agents and for the development of a regional resource library. This grant made it possible for Oxfam America to provide The Relief Society of Tigray (REST) with one large capacity grinding mill, three smaller capacity mills as well as spare parts and shipping costs. These mills directly benefitted poor farming families who, in the face of severe drought and a prolonged civil war, have become dependent on food aid.

Development Assistance to Habero Farmers \$62,000

This grant helped Oxfam America to work with the Eritrean Relief Association (ERA) and other local organizations to enable peasant farmers in Habero district to regain their livelihood after years of war, drought and famine. USA for Africa funds provided farmers with seed, oxen, agricultural tools and training

Oxfam UK Oxford, England

Oxfam, a British VDO based in Oxford, has considerable relief and development experience in Africa. In Chad, Oxfam has a special interest in assisting pastoral populations in arid areas.

1988

Wello Relief Transport Operation Workshop \$620,654

Project funds helped maintain an existing trucking operation to ensure transport vehicle readiness to deliver food and supply transportation programs from Dessie in the Wello Region. I involved a fleet of 28 vehicles andwas operated in cooperation with Save the Children/UK and the Relief and Rehabilitation Commission of Ethiopia. Hear 'n Aid provided \$200,000 towards this grant.

Relief and Rehabilitation Commission (RRC) P.O.Box 5686 Addis Ababa, Ethiopia

RRC is a government unit that coordinates relief efforts and assists disaster victims and the displaced populations in Ethiopia.

1986

Small Grinding Mills \$296,199

Funds were used to purchase grinding mills for drought affected people trom Wello and Tigray Administrative Regions.

Save the Children Federation (SCF/US)

Save the Children is a private, voluntary, non-sectarian community development organization founded in 1932. Save the Children programs aim to improve the quality of life for children, their families, and their communities through self-help development projects.

1986

Street Children's Project

\$ 150,000

This grant was used to alleviate the harsh living conditions of street children in Addis Ababa.It provided washing facilities, first aid and basic health services and a central meeting place for children to gather. The center, a vocational training site, allowed children to participate in regular counseling sessions and to obtain basic literacy /numeracy skills.

1987

Primary Health Development Training Program \$300,000

This program was to strengthen the district health infrastructure by providing primary health care services and by increasing intersectoral collaboration between health, water, agriculture, cottage industries and education.

Surgical Care to Children of the World (SACOW) 195 North Village Avenue Rockville Centre, NY 11570

SACOW, a US based non-profit organization, has been working with Gondar College in Ethiopia for a number of years. They are collaborating with Case Western Reserve University and the Ministry of Health to implement an immunization campaign program.

1989

Meningitis Immunization Campaign \$34,870

This project aimed to utilize existing resources to immunize a population of 250,000 against an outbreak of meningitis in Northern Ethiopia. These resources included the deployment of medical, nursing and sanitation students from the local Medical College to implement vaccine distribution and delivery to local residents, and the provision of vaccines and immunization equipment by UNICEF.

TreePeople

Beverly Hills, CA 90210

TreePeople is a Los Angeles based voluntary organization that promotes tree planting in the US and, more recently,in Africa. It airlifted and planted over 5,000 three-year-old fruit trees Ethiopia, Kenya, Tanzania and Cameroon in the summer of 1986.

African Fruit Tree Partnership Program \$ 30,040

In partnershipo with VDOs based in Ethiopia, Kenya, Tanzania and Cameroon, TreePeople offered guidance to 14villages in fruit utilization and fruit tree master plans by making field visits and providing essential supplies and modest grants.

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)

78 Beacon Street Boston, MA 02108

The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee is a non-sectarian, non-profit membership organization founded in 1939 and dedicated to enhancing the economic, social, civil and political rights of people throughout the world.

1986

Eritrean Public Health Project \$128,000

This project established ten community health service centers and a district health station. In addition, a four-wheel drive vehicle was purchased, and support was provided for field staff working with drought victims and displaced persons in Eritrea.

United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF)

Three United Nations Plaza New York, NY 10017

UNICEF helps developing countries improve the condition of children and youth through assistance for community-based service in areas of primary health care, water supply, formal and non-formal education, nutrition, and emergency operations.

1986

Emergency Medical Kits

\$ 328,304

This grant helped with the provision and transportation of essential drugs distributed through VDOs and church groups which were in a position to provide medical services. Over 140 emergency medical kits were purchased and shipped with these funds.

United Nations Office of Emergency Operations in Africa (UNOEOA)

One United Nations Plaza Room DC1-2389 New York, NY 10017

OEOA,was a temporary special temporary unit established by the UN Secretary General.Its role was to facilitate inter-agency cooperation and provide the basis for a concerted international response to the emergency in Africa.

1985

Grain Bagging \$100,000

The grant helped cover the cost of bagging several hundred tons of grain which were airdropped in an emergency operation in Ethiopia.

1987

Polish Helicopters Squadron \$450,000

Funds were provided to help transport food, medical teams and medical supplies byhelicopter to relief operations in remote areas of Ethiopia.

Transport Operation In Ethiopia (WTOE)

P.O.Box 60044 ECA Building Addis Ababa,Ethiopia

WTOE, headquartered in Addis Ababa, was created in 1985 for the purpose of increasing food delivery to the drought-affected regions in Ethiopia, and to manage the U.N. transport fleet in the country. WTOE is a major relief food carrier in Ethiopia.

Port Improvement Project \$539,964

This project was funded to improve port facilities at Port Assab. This included the purchase of 2,900 fiberglass pallets; training support for a International Labor Organization specialists in food handling and the purchase of flatbed trailers and two mobile cranes.

1986

Transportation Operation \$113,795

These funds were used topurchase radio equipment for a fleet of 116 tractor-trailers with a monthly distribution capacity of 13,285 tons. Weekly runs were made from Assab to Wollo, Tigre, Gondor and Northern Shoa. Drivers and heavy equipment operators were also provided with training under this project.

Jahaly-Pacharr Small Holder Project \$550,000

This grant provided assistance to women involved in a large irrigated rice cultivation scheme in the Jahaly-Pacharr region of The Gambia. Day care were built and equiped, and donkey carts and rice threshers were provided to women's groups to help them take better advantage of this large government sponsored development project.

The Association of Non-Governmental Organizations (TANGO)

TANGO was formed in 1984 in response to a growing need to coordinate NGO activity in TheGambia. TANGO currently has over 20 members, and has sponsored a number of workshops and training sessions, including a major workshop on NGO/Government collaboration. TANGO produces a quarterly newsletter of NGO activities, and its membership is represented on various inter-agency task forces.

1989

Tesito Program \$50,000

Funding provided institutional support to TANGO for the establishment of its Secretariat and training sessions of interest to its members. Funds were also earmarked to facilitate the formation and growth of new local NGOs through technical and fundraising assistance, and to provide a tramework for fostering collaborative relationships among NGOs and between NGOs and the Government.

KENYA

Samburu Aid in Africa (SAIDIA)

P.O. Box 48700 Nairobi, Kenya

SAIDIA is a small indigenous VDO organized by volunteers to promote community oriented development in Northern Kenya with an initial focus on health.

1987

Water Supply and Health Care Project \$150,000

Funds were used to provide sufficient water supply in Ngilai and Lesirikan districts in order to introduce agroforestry, semi-arid crops, animal husbandry and the provision of community

health services to the area. This grant was made by Hear'n Aid and administered by USA for Africa.

Inter-Africa Group (IAG)

P.O. Box 68145 Nairobi, Kenya

IAG is an indigenous NGO staffed by citizens from Kenya, Ethiopia, Sudan, and Somalia whose goals are to provide both the physical and institutional needs of the poor in the Horn of Africa region. IAG takes an integrated ap-proach to development and serves as a resource for NGO's in the region in the areas of technical assistance and funding information. In recognition of its important role in the Horn, IAG was nominated as a member of the World Bank NGO committee and is an official participant of the 1990 Alan Shawn Feinstein World Hunger Award.

1991

Emergency Rehabilitation Program in the Horn of Africa \$91,850

USA for Africa funds helped IAG to implement an integrated emergency rehabilitation program to assist famine and war victims in the rural areas of Southern Sudan, Ethiopia and Somalia. Program components included rehabilitation of water sources, primary health care, nutrition, housing, and training of NGO staff.

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Agency for Co-operation and Research in Development (ACORD)

Francis House,Francis Street, London SW1P 1DQ, United Kingdom

ACORD is an international consortium of European NGOs which provides support to local organizations and implements its own large-scale,long-term integrated development programs in Africa.

Pastoral Redevelopment \$41,750

Funds, provided through Oxfam-U.K., contributed to ACORD's on-going program emphasizing long-term survival strategies for pastoralists hard-hit by drought. Working with loca/ cooperatives, the program promoted the cultivation of animal fodder and small dairy production units managed by individual co-ops, and supported the reconstitution of small livestock herds for neediest co-op members.

African Development Bank (ADB)

The ADB is the largest indigenous multinational finance institution in Africa. Its central purpose includes financing projects that promote Africa's long term development. 1987

Sélengué Fishing Project \$ 300,000

Following the construction of a dam and the creation of a lake at Sélengué, efforts were made to facilitate the development of a local fishing industry in the region. Funds were used to equip fisherman withness and approximately 80 boats and outboard motors. In addition, an ice production plan was set up, and a 3 ton truck was purchased to help with the transport and marketing of fish.

AFRICARE

Washington, DC 20001

Africare assists in the human and economic development of African countries by developingwater resources, increased food production, delivery of basic health services, and emergency assistance to refugees. 1985

Food Production Project \$310,000

These funds were used to expand anirrigation system for the benefit of approximately 5,500 people. Better and increased irrigation allowed communities to double the number of harvests to two per year.

1985

Goundam Dispensary Construction \$83,000

The people of Goundam Circle benefitted from these funds through the construction of two dispensaries and the procurement of medical equipment, medications and supplies.

1986

Goundam Well Construction \$70,000

This project constructed cement-lined wells in 17 villages in Goundam Circle to provide drinking water to populations deprived of sufficient quantities of potable drinking water.

1986

Ganganiberi Agricultural Cooperative \$73,172

Funds were used to promote increased production of wheat,millet,sorghum,rice and leguminous crops. The increase was accomplished through an upgrading and extension of irrigation systems, along with improvements in water management and the technical methods of cooperative members.

American Friends Service Committee (AFSC)

1501 Cherry Street Philadelphia,PA 19102

Founded in 1917,AFSC promotes self-help and independence, and works to improve people's physical, economic and social well-being.AFSC works out of a Quaker concern for recon-ciliation and the relief of suffering.

1986

Women's Garden Project

\$49,114

This project was implemented by AFSC's Malian partner, FEDEV/AED. It increased production in 11 existing women's gardens through the construction of improved wells and a canal system to improve water use. In addition to increasing family nutrition by increasing the consumption of garden produce, and providing income generating possibilities for rural women, the project also sought to improve long-term capacities to garden in times of drought and increase technical capacities of local well diggers and masons.

1986

Mali Nomad Program \$73,000

This grant contributed to AFSC's long-term Nomad assistance program in the region and was used for the construction of reinforced concrete floodgates and earthen dikes along the Tassankant arm of the Niger River.

Association des Artisans de la Commune II

BP 1502 Bamako,Mali

The Artisans' Association was formed in 1985 and is made up of some 130 artisans, 396 apprentices, and their families. An association of informal sector mechanics, masons, electricians, carpenters, painters, metal workers, etc..., this organization exists to promote solidarity and mutual support among its members.

1990

Artisans Capitalization Project \$50,000

This grant was used to set up a "revolving fund" of capital goods to ensure artisans'access to primary materials and basic production tools and equipment to improve their production and increase the value of their labor. Funds also helped the association to set up a research, orientation and mnethodology unit to help individual artisans in micro-entreprise development.

Association Pour le Développement des Activitées de Production et de Formation (ADAF-GALLE)

Bamako, Mali

ADAF-GALLE is a newly created Malian NGO founded primarily by and for women. It works in the areas of water and food production, animal husbandry, credit and income generation.

1990

Integrated Development for Women \$49,000

This project assisted women's groups and youth in 2 villages to improve and expand their irrigated vegetable and rice production, to reduce their workload and increase productivity through the introduction of food processing machines and child care centers, and to improve mother-child health

Association d'Entreaide et de Développement (AED)

B.P. 153

Bamako, Mali

AED, formerly known as FEDEV, is a Malian voluntary development organization which seeks to aid local rural and semi-urban women's grassroots organizations. AED works with community groups to organize development projects in the areas of agricultural production, health and nutrition, income-generation, training, and exchange programs.

1988

Well Construction and Training Project \$56,000

This grant contributed to the organization's on-going work by providing 47 pumps for 19 garden wells in order to assure availability of water for women's marketgardens. AED provided training to some 60 villagers in the use and maintenance of pumps to assist them to work towards self-suficiency.

1991

Leadership Training Manual \$2,500

USA for Africa funds provided in 1989 through World Education, Inc., allowed members of AED and other Malian women's organizations to participate in an innovative series of exchange visits with a well-established women's organization in Kenya, Tototo Home Industries. This grant contributed to the adaptation and development of a Leadership Training manual for Malian women who play key roles in grassroots community development. The manual was published in French and in local languages.

Projet de Sante et de Planification Familiale de Katibougou de CEFDAP

Projet de Sante et de Planification Familiale de Katibougou Katibougou, Koulikoro

Begun in 1985, the CEDPA Katibougou Family Health Project was financed by the Washington, D.C.-based Center for Development and Population Activities (CEDPA). CEDPA is a non-profit management training organization dedicated to improving the skills of Third World managers of health, population and development programs.

1990

Katibougou Family Health Project \$10,000

This grant provided for the initiation of income-generating activities in order to support the work of fifty-four family planning/health agents in nine villages. These agents have been trained and organized into a network through the efforts of a Malian health department nurse in charge of CEFDAP activities in Katibougou. Oxfam America acted as fiscal receiver for this project.

Association Kilabo

Rue Leipzig/V. Feu Col. Sekou Touré Bamako, Mali

Association Kilabo was formed during the drought of 1984 as an effort by a group of young, educated Malians to respond to the crisis. Kilabo began with a series of small scale agricultural projects and training programs in health and nutrition in villages near Bamako. The micro-projects introduced the members of Kilabo to villagers and demonstrated the Association's ability to successfully work with communities to administer rural programs.

Rabbit Raising and Sweet Potato Production \$ 15,778

Funds were used to provide resources and management and technical training to the villagers of Nieniebougou,41 Km from Bamako, in sweet potato production and in the care and raising of rabbits. Sweet potatoes are used both to nourish the villagers and to feed the rabbits. Excess sweet potatoes are sold in local markets, and a "rabbit revolving loan fund" has successfully introduced rabbit raising in a number of surrounding villages.

1989

Institutional Support Grant \$32,400

Faced with an increasing number of demands on its resources, Kilabo felt it was necessary to reinforce and stabilize its institutional structure. These funds allowed the association to assure a stipend for its Project Coordinator for twoyears, and to purchase and maintain a project vehicle in order to monitor programs and transport materials to project sites.

Association Languedocienne D'Aide Au Développement (ALAD)

12, Grande-Rue 30000 Nimes,France

ALAD is a non-profit agency established in France in 1985. Its goal is to sustain development projects in developing countries, specifically in West Africa.

1986

Agricultural and Health Development in Kalabanbougou \$115,000

These funds were used to construct a three-classroom primary school building and a maternity and Mother/Child Health Centers in two communities. Funds were also used to help women at the village level to insure food self-sufficiency through the development of water resources.

Association Malienne pour l'Insertion Professionelle des Jeunes (AMIPJ)

BP 3179 Bamako,Mali

AMIPJ is a voluntary development organization created in 1986 by Malian University graduates in response to the difficulties encountered in finding meaningful employment. The mission of the group is to put the skills of its members into community development through projects identified and developed by them and their communities.

1988

Musow Ka Yiriwa Program \$50,000

Funds were used to support an integrated community development program which included the improvement of sanitary conditions, nutrition education, training of village women in agricultural and cooperatives management, reinforcement of solidarity among women around productive activities, and income generation.

1990

Sélegué Fishing Project \$42,660

This grant was designed to provide fishing equipment, fish drying materials, and technical support to a well-organized but undercapitalized fishing cooperative near the Sélegué Dam in southern Mali

Association Malienne de Recherche-Actions et de Développement (AMRAD)

B.P.1647 Bamako, Mali

AMRAD is an applied research and development agency which has initiated activities that include development training for teachers and villagers, irrigation and market gardening projects, and research in environmental and development issuJes. AMRAD presently serves as a consultant to the provincial government on environmental issues within the region of Timbuktu.

1988

Sheep-Herder Project \$ 80,000

This grant helped revitalize livestock breeding and herding in order to combat rural exodus from the region around Niafunké. Herders were able to insure a ready supply of fodder through the cultivation of "bourgou" grasses. The project also introduced better animal breeding practices and provided literacy and numeracy training. Participants have leamed to use and maintain a motorized irrigation system, as well as improved accounting and management techniques.

1989

Sheep-Herder Project (II) \$22,000

This second grant to AMRAD's project provided fencing materials to protect the irrigated bourgou nurseries, and a motorized canoe to facilitate harvesting of mature bourgou grasses which are planted along the sides of the river Niger.

Association Tassaght

BP 32

Gao, Mali

Tassaght was created in 1985 and was the first Malian VDO to establish its headquarters in coordinating committee after discussion and approval by the General Assembly. Tassaght's goal is to raise the standard of living of rural populations while remaining respectful of their local traditions.

1990

Integrated Development \$46,100

Association Tassaght used these funds to work with some 500 herdering families who were forced by droughtto settle and adopt sedentary livestyles. Project activites included efforts to improve the health of local animals, promoting vegetable and date palm production, the construction of cereal banks, and the provision of basic literacy and management skills training.

CARE

660 First Avenue

New York, NY 10016

CARE's goal is to help the world's poor in their efforts to achieve long-term health care social and economic well-being, and to offer relief in times of crisis.

1986

Macina Wells Project \$148,960

This grant was used to improve living conditions of approximately 40,000 people and additional numbers of nomads by providing improved water supplies for drinking and other household purposes.

1988

Macina Well Construction and Training \$ 100,000

Since 1982 CARE-Mali has undertaken four major water well construction projects. The problem of water supply remains acute, especially in Macina Cercle which is far from the Niger River and its canals. This project in central Mali improved the supply of potable water by constructing additional concrete wells and providing training to local residents in well construction and maintenence.

Comité de Coordination des Actions des ONG (CCA-ONG)

BP 1721 Bamako,Mali

CCA-ONG, an NGO consortium originally formed to coordinate emergency actions connected with the drought in 1983, now has 83 members and some 40 partners. Its basic role is to strengthen partnership and coordinated actions between members, and to serve as the major contact point for the NGO community with government, bilateral and multilateral agencies interested in grassroots development in Mali.

1990

Support to Information Unit \$27,320

This project was designed to increase the Unit's capacity to visit and collect information about projects implemented by CCA-ONG members, to improve the quality of information in the Unit's widely distributed Information Bulletin, and to provide training programs in project development for members.

Support to Logistical Unit \$38,500

This grant allowed CCA-ONG to purchase an additional project vehicle for its motor pool. These vehicles are rented out at reasonable rates to CCA-ONG members and partners, allowing groups which cannot afford to maintain sufficient equipment on their own to have access to project vehicles when they need them.

1991

Institutional Support \$125,000

This grant assisted CCA-ONG in strengthening and improving its ongoing support services to Malian NGOs.

Family Health International

Research Triangle Park, NC 27709

Family Health International is an American VDO that has been working with the Malian Ministry of Public Health and the Malian Family Planning Association since 1979 to improve maternal and child health in Mali.

1987

Pilot Intervention Project to Slow the Spread of AIDS \$62,150

This pilot project sought to develop effective educational strategies and to demonstrate the effectiveness of condom and spermicide use in preventing AIDS. The campaign focused on 160 prostitutes in Bamako in order to inform them of the risk for contracting and spreading AIDS and tomotivate them to protect themselves and their clients. Surveys were conducted to determine HIV and seroconversion status. The results of the pilot project were to be used in designing prevention programs on a national level.

Garage Repair Facility \$440,000

Funds were used for the construction of a garage used during emergency relief operations by private voluntary and United Nations organizations in Gao, Mali for the repair of their vehicles.

Oeuvre Malienne d'Aide a l'Enfance du Sahel (OMAES)

B.P.2323 Bamako,Mali

OMAES was created in 1982 with the objective of promoting material and moral support to mothers and children of the Sahel. The organization promotes long-term development as a way of protecting the population against the effects of future droughts. The organization's activities have in-cluded immunization programs, health dispensaries, well construction, gardening projects and resettlement for displaced people.

1991

Missira Nomad Resettlement-Phase Ill \$60,234

This grant supported the third and final phase of a long-term nomad resettlement project undertaken by OMAES in collaboration with UNAIS (United Nations Association/International Service). This phase was directed at further enhancing the resettled community's capacity to attain food self-sufficiency anad generate income opportunities, and to complete the development of housing and health care infrastructures. This phase also sought to increase the ability of community leaders to manage their affairs independently of OMAES project staff through providing literacy, organizational and financial management training.

STOP-Sahel s/c CCA-ONG B.P. 1721 Bamako,Mali STOP-Sahel is a Malian non-governmental development organization whose primary focus is on water resources development and working to overcome the erosion and depletion of Mali's natural resources.

1991

Balandougou Irrigated Development Project \$5,000

This grant was used to support the continuation of the second phase of this project funded by USA for Africa in 1990. This phase of the project provided village leaders with training in project/water resource management.

United Nations Association/International Service (UNAIS)

B.P. 2119

Bamako Mali

Headquartered in London, UNAIS provides technical volunteers to developing countries to support programs in the areas of water development, primary health care, environmental conservation, income-generation, and sanitation. UNAIS also carries out development education work in the U.K. The agency has been working in Mali since 1979.

1991

Mopti Resettlement Program \$5,000

This grant was used to support the continuation of this long-term nomad resettlement project funded by USA for Africa in 1987 and in 1990. Resettled families received training and support in rice and vegetable production and in improving their herds. The project also involved the construction of housing, a school and a market.

United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF)

Three United Nations Plaza New York, NY 10017 UNICEF helps developing countries improve conditions of children and youth through assistance for community-based service in areas of primary health care, water supply, formal and non-formal education, nutrition, and emergency operations.

1986

Food Supplementary Program \$222,250

These funds provided food,logistical support,personnel, kitchen utensils, blankets and other essential materials for nutriion centers in the severely drought-affected regions of Mopti and Timbuktu.

University of Rochester, Department of Pediatrics

601 Elmwood Avenue Rochester, NY 14642

A formal Sister City relationship between the cities of Bamako, Mali and Rochester, New York was established in 1975. Since then the Bamako-Rochester Sister Cities Committee has sponsored student exchanges, city delegate visits, medical assistance, and intercultural understanding.

1987

Emergency Assistance Project for Maternal Child Health Care \$39,800

The purpose of this project was to enhance Bamako's maternal and child health care delivery systems by establishing stronger links between health educators and providers in Bamako and Rochester. Funds were used to implement a collaborative training workshop for the staff of six Matemal-Child Health Centers to improve health care for mothers and childrenin the City of Bamako.

Rochester-Bamako Maternal-Child Health Project \$60,635

The Rochester-Bamako MCH Project is a collaborative preventive health care project in which health professionals in the 2 cities hold joint training sessions in nutrition and well-child care for the staffs of Bamako. These funds were used to continue an on-going program to strengthen vitally needed health care services for mothers and children in Bamako.

Vétérinaires sans Frontières (VSF)

BP 1660 Bamako,Mali

VSF, a French VDO which began working in Mali during the 1984 drought, concentrated on reinstituting methods for drying and conserving meat, and addressing the food needs of populations affected by the drought. Through their activities, VSF is able to engage breeders in more general discussions concerning sanitation practices, need for better slaughterhouses, and adequate vaccinations.

1987

Regeneration of Pastures \$20,000

This grant was used to initiate pasture regeneration activities which centered on the production of fodder plants of bourgou beds which would nourish the cattle in the reconstituted herds. Funding supported the opening of a RADI office in the Casamance region and a portion of its administrative costs for two years. The Casamance region in southern Senegal is largely neglected by development organizations. With its extension office in the area, RADI has been better able to provide training, follow-up and monitoring to the village organizations with which it works.

Support to Farmer's Associations \$194,000

These funds supported the production and economic development activities of three farmers groups in Casamance:the Association of Young Farmers of Casamance (AJAC), The Federation of the Association for the Community Development of Balantacounda, and the Union for the Development of Boudie. RADI provided technical assistance, equipment and supplies, and management support to a diverse series of village initiatives. These included the construction of 10 new communal granaries and a seed bank, food and cash crop production, and the introduction of imprwd agricultural techniques and technologies.

1989

Support to Senegalese Repatriates & Mauritanian Refugees \$195,357

Funds were used to help refugees,repatriated Senegalese and local community groups cultivate 75 hectares of rice and tomatoes in three communities in the Fleuve Region in northern Senegal. Funding permitted RADI to obtain pumps and irrigation equipment, tools, and other agricultural imputs.

1990

Literacy and Training for Women's Groups \$49,400

RADI works closely with community organizations in 14 villages in and around Thiès to develop large-scale vegetable production and marketing initiatives. Terre des Hommes implements and funds projects in the areas of agriculture, primary health care, education, training, and animation. It also works to sensitize the French public to the real causes, and remedies, of debt and food problems.

Improved Vocational Training

\$55,884This project was carried out jointly by Terre des Hommes and the Chambre de Métiers de Dakar. Its objective was to conceive and put in place an alternative model of professional training for young apprentices in the non-industrial (craft) sector. Over 75 apprentices were selected and trained through this initiative.

Union des Groupements Paysans de Meckhé (UGM)

BP 8

Meché, Senegal

UGM is a farmers' cooperative which was created in 1983. The group, which began as a small cooperative in one village, has now expanded to include nearly 30 villages.

1988

Livestock and Agricultural Development \$60,000

This project increased agricultural productivity and improved accessibility to water sources in the region of Thies.

Funds were used to generate income through livestock and vegetable production.

World Relief

P.O. Box WRC Wheaton,IL 60189

Founded in 1944, World Relief promotes and supports self-help community development projects through training, technical help, and project funding. World Relief also supplies emergency assistance as a result of natural disaster or war.

1988

Women in Development in Diourbel \$22,660

This grant was used to introduce labor saving appropriate technology and training to village women in 5 villages. Training in labor saving devices, health seminars and literacy were organized under this program.

World Vision

World Vision is a Christian non-profit organization working in the areas of childcare, community and leadership development, health, agricultural production, social welfare, and development education.

1986

Louga Child Survival Project \$347,358

This project provided basic health care training in more than 2,000 villages in the Louga Region in order to reduce the high mortality rate of children. The training included instruction on the sate storage of potable water, the use of oral rehydration therapy, of malaria prophylaxis, and of innoculations against childhood diseases.

Horumarin is an indigenous VDO registered with the government of Somalia which focuses its efforts on relief and development work.

1987

Basic Health Care in Bakol region \$100,000

Funds were used to supportprimary health care through nutritional surveillance and monitoring, health education, immunization and sanitation in one of the affected regions in Somalia. This grant was funded by Hear'n Aid and administered by USA for Africa.

United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees

UNHCR's primary goal is to promote durable solutions to refugee problems through voluntary repatriation, local integration or resettlement in another country.

Ethiopian Refugee Project \$377,750

These funds were used by UNHCR and World Concern to assist and meet the needs of thousands of refugees from Ethiopia who had fled into northwest Somalia. The grant allowed them to purchase medicines, and medical equipment for transit centers; fuel to transport refugees from the centers to camps; blankets, water containers, cooking oil; and tires and batteries for the tanker truck, supplying water to refugee camps.

This project was designed to increase the self-reliance of refugees and residents within and around the Qala-en-Nahal settlement. Funds were used to purchase tractors and tools, and for the construction of a "hafir" to store water.

Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA)

ADRA, a US-based VDO founded in 1956, provides emergency relief services and implements long-term development assistance programs.

1986

Dining Hall/Kitchen Complex Construction \$134,837

Funds contributed to the rehabilitation of the Sheik Lutfi secondary school in order to accommodate a larger number of displaced students from Southern Sudan.

Dormitory Construction at Lutfi School \$84,033

This grant wasused for the construction of a dormitory and a garden with a well for the benefit of displaced students.

Muniki Mother and Child Project \$104,650

This grant was used to provide a program of preventive, curative and rehabilitative health care for infants, children and mothers in the Muniki area.

Ahfad University for Women/lowa State University

P.O. Box 167

Omdurman, Sudan

Ahfad University for Women is a four-year women's university established in 1966 by the Bedri family to educate women for leadership in effecting change in rural areas. International education and development are high priorities for lowa State University.

1989

White Nile Water Project \$44,400

The purpose of this project was to capitalize on established links between the two universities in order to promote further improvements in food security and health care through water projects and education in rural centers in the White Nile area.

American Refugee Committee

American Refugee Committee works to assist people who have left their homelands because of disaster, warfare, or other threats to their health and well-being. The organization provides training, nutritional aid and medical care for refugees.

1987

Local Settlement of Ethiopian Refugees \$119,160

Funds contributed to a program designed to ensure adequate health care for 5,000 Ethiopian refugees living in the settlement of Fau 5 in Eastern Sudan. Components funded through this grant included preventive and curative health services and supplementary feeding.

Medical Training & Health Education Program in Wad Sherife \$52,012

This program provided training to eligible refugees in healthcare, maternal and child health and public health techniques appropriate to their community's culture.

1987

Safawa Public Health & Medical Program \$30,289

Funds were used to provide 15,000 Ethiopian refugees with adequate curative and preventive health care measures. Training in health care was also provided to the refugee staff.

Emergency Food and Transportation \$305,194

Funding provided a three-week training program for 30 medicalofficers in project planning, coordination, and

Construction of Lined Shallow Wells \$45,000

Grant funds were used to construct lined water wells, thereby providing an adequate amount of improved-quality water to communities.

1987

Vaccination Program in the South White Nile \$44,716

Funds were used to vaccinate three year old children against D.P.T., B.C.G. measles and polio;to administer tetanus toxoid to pregnant mothers and provide health education in Kosti District, South White Nile Province.

1987

Vaccination Program in North Kordofan \$13,052

Funds contributed to a program of vaccination of all children under three years of age, targeting those under the age of one. The program also helped to educate the population about the need for series vaccinations and administered tetanus toxoid to antenatal mothers.

This grant was used to establish a workshop with a display room for the production of ladies' handbags and national clothing manufactured in small quantites.

FAR was initiated by two Canadian organizations and one U.S. organization, Emmanuel International, and World Relief Canada and World Relief Corporation of USA. Integrated Rehabilitation at Hamrat EI Wuz \$82,000

The integrated rehabilitation project was used to enhance the ability of the people in this rural council to prevent hunger, malnutrition and forced migration from their homes by providing means to combatdrought, deforestation and desertification.

Integrated Rehabilitation at El Sidir \$48,400

Grant funds were used to prevent malnutrition, disease, and forced migration of the people of El Sidirby providing sufficient sources of potable water, combating desertification, increasing the supply of nutritious food, and training local residents to maintain development gains.

ICRC is a Swiss-based private, independent humanitarian agency that provides assistance to victims of war and in conflict areas.

Emergency Medical Assistance \$81,281

This program provided emergency medical kits to be used in the severely famine-affected area of Bahr-El-Ghazal province in Southern Sudan.

Islamic African Relief Agency (IARA)

Khartoum, Sudan

IARA is an indigenous VDO founded in 1981 to offer relief and development assistance to refugees and displaced and needy communities. IARA's activities cover three continents, and the organization has offices in 14 African countries.

1989

Family Health Care Program in Greater Khartoum \$50,000

Funding was used to raise the technical standards and capacities of health workers through regularized and appropriate training courses, and through the provision of essential medical supplies and equipment.

1990

Accomodation of 200 Families \$149,300

This project is designed to accommodate 200 vulnerable displaced families from Southern Sudan in the Sennar Agricultural scheme by establishing a clinic, extending services to feeding centers and digging a shallow well.

Lalmba Association

Lalmba is an international non-profit corporation which has been working in Africa for 24 years. For the past decade, Lalmba has provided medical, developmental and education services to eastern Sudan.

1988

General Use Vehicle \$9,800

Funds were used to purchase a vehicle for Lalmba projects, thus providing transportation for both Ethiopian refugees and Sudanese nationals servedby Lalmba.

Integration Center for Homeless Children \$25,450

This project was designed to provide homeless Ethiopian children with education and skills needed to become a successful part of their society.

Medical Volunteers International

Medical Volunteers International is a non-profit organization incorporated in California in 1984. Its members are medical professionals who provide primary health care and training programs to Third World countries as alternatives to crisis intervention.

1987

Child Survival Project in Tokar North \$150,000

This program was designed to improve the health status of the children in Tokar North by teaching principles of child health and nutrition, thereby reducing child morbidity and mortality. It established 15 nutritional centers to reach at least 85% of the rural population and to monitor the growth of infants and provide supplementary food as needed.

Nafir Public Organization (NPO)

Khartoum, Sudan

Nafir Public Organization is an indigenous agency whose goal is to help people develop skills to resolve their own problems.

1988

Provision of Drinking Water \$53,520

Funding helped provide drinking water to humans and animals through the construction of 25 shallow wells in 12villages in the southeast part of the Sudan. The project was conceived as a self-help activity, with the local people playing an active role in its implementation.

The aims of this project are to provide potable water, enable displaced children to get a primary education, and help the community of Haj Yousif and adjacent villages to maintain a clean environment.

SCOVA is an association of non-governmental non-profit agencies registered with the address humanitarian needs in the Sudan. SCOVA currently represents over 40 organizations.

Funds contributed to this conference provided an opportunity for indigenous VDOs from seven countries in the Hom of Africa to come together, exchange information and draw conclusions from their relevant experiences.

Sudanese Juvenile Care Organization (SJCO)P.O.Box 4375

Khartoum, Sudan

Sudanese Juvenile Care Organization is a VDO which helps homeless, abandoned, or orphaned children, and provides aid for poor families.

1988

Maternal and Child Health Clinic \$100,000

The project established a clinicin the remote area of Kadougli in western Sudan in order to provide full-scalematernal and child health services, including preventative and treatment services as well as community health education.

Sudan Relief and Rehabilitation Association (SRRA)

The Sudan Relief and Rehabilitation Association (SRRA) is a non- profit humanitarian association founded in the United States in 1986. This funding was used for a feasibility study which included an intensive review of the adequacy of water and health services in ahospital in Darfur.

Funds were used to research and develop a strategy to increase US NGO involvement in AIDS preventionactivities in Africa.Results were discussed at a one-day session with key NGO representatives and a background paper with recommendations was presented at a World Health Organization meeting in Geneva in November 1988.

1990

Strengthening NGO Programs in AIDS Prevention \$25,000

This grant has allowed NCIH to push forward policy and information initiatives designed to increase the number of US NGOs working in AIDS prevention. NCIH works to strengthen African NGOs working in AIDS prevention andhas given representatives of these organizations an opportunity to influence deliberations at the International AIDS Conference in San Francisco in June 1990.

The National Council of Negro Women (NCNW)

NCNW has been in exisitence for over 50 years, and has been involved in international development for over a decade. NCNW has emphasized working in partnership with African women's organizations in the development of their programs.

1988

Development Education: People Reaching People \$50,000

Funds contributed to a massive public education effort which involved training 2,400 development education advocates, conducting outreach activities at Black Family Reunion events, and extending the public education message through the launching of a new publication called "Sisters" magazine.

OEF International

OEF has worked for nearly 40 years in over 50 countries supporting womens efforts in the eradication of hunger and poverty. OEF has allocated increasing resources towards development education efforts in the US.

1988

Women to Women: US-Africa Dialogues

\$43,767

Funds were used to establish linkages and partnerships between 5 US and 5 Senegalese communities. Through an exchange of "video letters" highlighting women and their roles in their communities, women were able to gain a better sense of their differing circumstances and of the problems and aspirations they have in common.

Operation Crossroads Africa, Inc. (OCA)

150 Fifth Avenue Suite 310 New York, NY 10011

OCA has been committed since 1957 to providing Americans with the opportunities to learn about Africa and the Caribbean first hand, and to help them understand the causes of poverty and underdevelopment in those regions.

1988

Minority Internship Program \$50,000

Funds were used to reach minority Americans and institutions in a more systematic way through scholarships, educational materials, seminars, colloquia and other activities. Project objectives involved minorities in issues related to development, relief and US foreign policy towards Africa.

Overseas Development Network (ODN)

P.O.Box 2306 Stanford CA 94309

ODN is a national student organization with over 65 chapters that works to educate its own members and others about development issues. Its programs promote greater public understanding by encouraging students to be the conduits, as well as the receivers, of development education.

1988

Bike Aid Education Program \$40,000

Funds were used to develop the educational component of ODN's annual'Bike Aid' event, a cross country bicycle trip involving up to 150 cyclists and over 225 communities. Bike-Aid's main objectives are to get Third World and American citizens involved in educating each other; to overcome stereotypes and sensitize Americans to the importance of understanding Third World problems in their global contexts; and to move people towards long lasting interest and involvement in development issues.

The Panos Institute

Panos is an independent, international, information institute working to promote sustainable development by stimulating constructive and informed debate. It acts as a bridge between the media and the development community and between nongovernmental organizations and official agencies in developing and developed countries.

Aids Publication \$5,000

Funds contributed to the dissemination and distribution of a Panos publication on AIDS. A special effort was made to accomodate the tremendous demand for the publication in Third World countries, thereby widening the context and debate about AIDS.

1989

'War Wounds' Publication \$2,250

Funds were used to disseminate a Panos publication called War Wounds', which looks at the development costs of the civil war in Southem Sudan. Panos distributed 500 copies to specific groups which included leading foreign policy journalists and the African-American media, as wel as key policy makers in Congress.

Rodale International, a division of the non-profit Rodale Institute, supports the development of an international network for the sharing of information and technologies in the fields of agriculture, health and community development.

Journalists Program

\$25,000

Funds were used to create a Journalists Program to escort US journalists and media commentators on trips to visit successful development programs in Africa; to create an editorial division devoted to gathering and marketing case-study oriented educational materials for use within the US school system; and to incorporate development education messages into Rodale Press publications.

The Roosevelt Center for American Policy Studies 316 Pennsylvania Avenue, Suite 500 Washington, DC 20003

The Roosevelt Center, a nonpartisan public policy institution. Its main objective is increasing public understanding of critical national policy issues and encouraging citizen participation in the US policy making process.

1988

Hunger and Development Module \$50,000

Funds were used to develop educational materials and role playing exercises focusing on African hunger and development issues and to promote the direct involvement of a cross-section of US citizens in learning about these issues. The judgements of these participants were delivered to policymakers in Washington DC. in 1989.

The Synergos Institute

The Synergos Institute is a non-profit organization founded in 1986, which assists groups in both developed and developing countries to establish and operate partnerships for social action, and collaborative problem-solving processes.

1988

Synergos Workshop \$5.000

This grant provided for FAVDO memers from Africa to participate in a workshop held in New York. The workshop addressed the planning and institution building needs of three

partnership groups from different parts of the world where each group was permitted to define its own issues and planning problems for discussion.

TransAfrica Forum

Since its founding in 1981, TransAfrica Forum has been effective in educating and mobilizing the public toward greater participation in US foreign affairs by presenting alternative viewpoints on critical issues, and by broadening public debate on world affairs.

Program Support Grant \$50,000

TransAfrica Forum's main area of focus has been Third World development, particularly as it applies to Africa and the Caribbean. Funds were used to conduct research, policy analysis and educational and organizing activities focusing on five target groups: Women, Human Rights, Debt, Foreign Aid, and Labor.

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)

UUSC, founded in 1939, is dedicated to enhancing the economic, social, civil and political rights of people throughout the world. UUSC has also provided technical assistance, materials and financial support to Africa for over 25 years, and has extensive experience in public education on development issues.

Odyssey: From Alaska to Zimbabwe

Funds were used to support a pilot program of community action and learning about Atrica. The program was designed to clarity linkages between American and Atrican populations; promote changes in U.S. habits, attitudes and policies towards Africa; increase awareness about the global effects of racism, military aid, consumerism, and U.S. foreign and domestic policies; and initiate and support community services, coalition-building and issue advocacy in the U.S. on the local level.

Introductory Guide to Africa \$2,200

An "Introductory Guide to Africa" and an "Organizer's Handbook"were developed as an important part of the Odyssey project. These funds were used to publish the Guide in its final form and to distribute it to interested groups around the country.

Southern Africa Hunger and Development Education Project \$50,000

This grant supported WOA's efforts to draw the attention of the American public to the widespread conditions of starvation,malnutrition, underdevelopment and war which persist throughout the southern Africa region, and to encourage Americans to support relief and development efforts directed to the area.

Funds were used to plan and conduct pre-production research in Africa for the nationaltelevision event, 'Breakthrough on Hunger', and for research on how best to stimulate viewership and motivate viewers to action at the grassroots level in their communities.

World Hunger Year (WHY)

Public Education Program

\$5,000The grant was used to continue WHY's educational work on the problems of hunger and poverty through the publication of a special issue of their magazine Food Monitor entitled 'Reinvesting in America: Beyond Hunger and Homelessness'.

The purpose of this project was to pilot a model for a national leadership development program in order to provide experience to US physicians-in-training who were inerested in International Health care. It provided medical students and residents with an intensive sixmonth to one year training program in Africa in primary health care deliveryprograms.

AAWORD is a pan-African non-governmental association formed in 1977. AAWORDorganizes research working groups which members can join in accordance with their area of specialization and research interests.

1987

AAWORD organized a research project to identify the role of women as agents ofdevelopment and as recipients of development assistance. Questionnaires and interviews were used to determine the social, cultural and economic impact of women in the areas of adult education, research, rural development, health, and environment. The resulting report was published as an AAWORD Occasional Paper.

Center for Development and Population Activities (CEDPA)

FAVDO is the only continent-wide consortium of AVDOs organized and run by Africans. Its main purpose is to create effective communications links and solidarity among NGOs in Africa and with other NGO networks in the South and North.

This grant was provided to support FAVDO's general program and administrative costs, including theestablishment of its Secretariat in Dakar. Funds were used for the establishment of sub-regional and national networks and associations of African development organizations, to provide training for AVDO leadership, and to increase communication and networking links across the continent.

INADES-Formation (African Institute for Economic and Social Development) is a regional African NGO with offices in a number of African countries. Development of Rural Training in Africa \$200,000

Funds were used to develop new approaches, methods, and materials for training rural women. Training was provided to project managers in farming techniques, health, home management and group organizing. Booklets, newsletters, training seminars, workshops, correspondence courses and field-visits were used to carry out this program in Cameroon, Côte D'Ivoire, Ethiopia and Burkina Faso.

The conference provided a forum where international, non-governmental representatives of the world public health community could exchange experiences and ideas on implementing primary and community health care under current social and economic conditions.

International Committee of African Women for Development (CIFAD)

CIFAD, a regional network of Women's organizations, is an international coordinating body with national committees in at least 17 countries in Africa. Its mandate is to help improve the status of women by providing acess to training opportunities and increasing communication and collaboration among African women.

This grant contributed to the costs of CIFAD's Second General Assembly,held in Yaoundé, Cameroon in October 1988. Discussions during the Assembly included reports on projects implemented by CIFAD national comittees, the creation of a documentation center and
